



40 management program should be achieving the wise use of the land and water resources  
41 of the coastal zone giving full consideration to ecological, cultural, historic and esthetic  
42 values and the need for compatible economic development.

43

44 **Endangered Species Act of 1973, as amended (16 USC §1531 et seq.)** – provides for  
45 the identification and protection of threatened and endangered plants and animals and  
46 their critical habitats. Requires federal agencies to conserve T/E species and cooperate  
47 with State and local authorities to resolve water resources issues in concert with the  
48 conservation of T/E species.

49 **Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (7 USC §136)** – Governs the  
50 use and application of pesticides in natural resource management programs.

51 **Federal Land Policy and Management Act (43 USC §1701)** – Establishes public land  
52 policy and guidelines for its administration and provides for the management, protection,  
53 development, and enhancement of the public lands.

54 **Federal Noxious Weed Act of 1974 (7 USC §2801 et seq.)** – Establishes control and  
55 eradication of noxious weeds and regulates them in interstate and foreign commerce.

56 **Federal Water Pollution Control Act as amended by the CWA of 1977 (33 USC**  
57 **§1251)** – Regulates dredging and filling of wetlands and waterbodies and establishes  
58 procedures for identifying and regulating non-point sources of pollutants, including  
59 turbidity, into waterways.

60 **Federal Water Pollution Control Act: Section 404, as amended by the CWA of 1977**  
61 **(33 USC §1251)**

62 – Prohibits the discharge of dredged or filled materials into waters of the United States,  
63 including wetlands, without first obtaining a permit from USACE. Activities in wetlands  
64 that require federal permits include, but are not limited to: placement of fill material;  
65 ditching activities when the excavated material is sidcast, mechanized land clearing;  
66 land leveling; and most road construction.

67 **Fish and Wildlife Conservation Act (16 USC §2901)** – Provides for the protection of  
68 non-game fish and wildlife.

69 **Fish and Wildlife Coordination Act (16 USC §661 et seq.)** – Provides mechanism for  
70 wildlife conservation to receive equal consideration and be coordinated with water-  
71 resource development programs.

72 **Floodplain Management (EO 11988)** – Requires agencies to assess the effects that  
73 their actions may have on floodplains and to consider alternatives to avoid adverse  
74 effects and incompatible development on floodplains.

75 **Forest and Rangeland Renewable Resources Planning Act (16 USC §1601 et seq.)**  
76 – Requires and inventory of potential renewable resources and an evaluation of  
77 opportunities for improving their yield on goods and services. Agencies must provide an  
78 opportunity for public involvement and consultation with other agencies in establishing  
79 policies for multiple use and sustained yield.

80 **Greening the Government through Leadership in Environmental Management (EO**  
81 **13148)** – This EO (Section 207, Environmentally and Economically Beneficial  
82 Landscaping) states that “each agency shall strive to promote the sustainable  
83 management of Federal facility lands through the implementation of cost-effective,  
84 environmentally sound landscaping practices, and programs to reduce adverse impacts  
85 to the natural environment.”

86 **Hunting and Fishing on Federal Lands (10 USC §2671 et seq.)** – establishes  
87 requirements for regulating hunting, fishing, and trapping on military lands.

88 **Indian Sacred Sites (EO 13007)** – Provides for the protection of and access to Indian  
89 sacred sites.

90 **Invasive Species (EO 13112)** – Requires Federal agencies to: “prevent the introduction  
91 of invasive species”; “detect and respond rapidly to and control populations of such  
92 species in a cost-effective and environmentally sound manner”; “monitor invasive  
93 species populations accurately and reliably, provide for restoration of native species and  
94 habitat conditions in ecosystems that have been invaded”; “conduct research on invasive  
95 species and develop technologies to prevent introduction and provide for  
96 environmentally sound control of invasive species”; and “promote public education on  
97 invasive species and the means to address them.”

98 **Land and Water Conservation Act of 1965 (16 USC §4601 et seq.)** – assists in  
99 preserving, developing, and assuring accessibility to outdoor recreation resources.

100 **Legacy Resource Protection Program Act (P.L. 101-511)** – established a program for  
101 the stewardship of biological, geophysical, cultural and historic resources on DoD lands.

102 **Migratory Bird Conservation Act (16 USC §715 et seq.)** – Establishes a Migratory  
103 Bird Conservation Commission to approve areas recommended by the Secretary of the  
104 Interior for acquisition with Migratory Bird Conservation Funds.

105 **Migratory Bird Treaty Act, as amended (16 USC §703-712)** – Prohibits the taking or  
106 harming of a migratory bird, its eggs, nests, or young without the appropriate permit.

107 **National Aquatic Invasive Species Act of 2003 (NAISA).** Federal legislation to  
108 combat invasive aquatic species introduced.

109  
110 **National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended (42 USC §4321)** – Provides  
111 a national charter for protection of the environment and requires Federal agencies to  
112 prepare a statement of environmental impact in advance of each major action that may  
113 significantly affect the quality of the human environment.

114 **National Historic Preservation Act of 1966 (16 USC §470 et seq.)** – provides for the  
115 preservation of historic properties throughout the U.S.

116 **Non-indigenous Aquatic Nuisance Prevention and Control Act of 1990, as**  
117 **amended (16 U.S.C 4701 et seq.)** – established a program to prevent the introduction  
118 of and to control the spread of introduced aquatic nuisance species and the brown tree  
119 snake.

120 **Off Road Vehicle Use on Public Lands (EO 11989)** – limits the use of off-road vehicles  
121 on federal lands soil, water, or natural resources could be adversely affected.

122 **Oil Pollution Prevention Act of 1990, Public Law 101-380** – Redefines the  
123 requirements of the National Contingency Plan to include planning for, rescue of,  
124 minimization of injury to, and assessment of damages for injury to fish and wildlife  
125 resources.

126 **Outleasing for Grazing and Agriculture on Military Lands (10 USC §2667)** –  
127 provides for the outleasing of public lands.

128 **Protection and Enhancement of Environmental Quality (EO 11514)** – provides for  
129 environmental protection of federal lands and enforces requirements of NEPA.

130 **Protection and Enhancement of the Cultural Environment (EO 11593)** – supports  
131 previous laws and provides for additional protection of cultural resources.

132 **Protection of Wetlands (EO 11990)** – requires agencies to take action to minimize the  
133 destruction, loss or degradation of wetlands, and to preserve and enhance the beneficial  
134 values of wetlands.

135 **Recreational Fisheries (EO 12962)** – requires Federal agencies, to the extent  
136 practicable and where permitted by law, "to improve the quantity, function, sustainable  
137 productivity, and distribution of U.S. aquatic resources for increased recreational fishing  
138 opportunities".

139 **Responsibilities of Federal Agencies To Protect Migratory Birds (EO13186)** –  
140 requires federal agencies to protect and conserve habitat for migratory birds within the  
141 United States to the extent feasible.

142 **Sale of Certain Interests in Land, Logs (10 USC §2665)** – Authorizes the sale of forest  
143 products and the reimbursement of the costs of managing forest resources for timber  
144 production.

145  
146 **Sikes Act "Conservation Programs on Military Reservations" (16 USC §670a et**  
147 **seq.)** – Requires Federal military installations with adequate wildlife habitat to implement  
148 cooperative agreements with other agencies and develop long-range integrated natural  
149 resources management plans. Thereby, it is appropriate to manage natural resources for  
150 multipurpose uses and provide the public access to those uses to the extent consistent  
151 with the military mission. The act also sets guidelines for the collection of fees for the  
152 use of natural resources such as hunting and fishing.

153  
154 **Soil Conservation Act (16 USC §590a et seq.)** – provides for soil conservation  
155 practices on Federal lands.

157 **State**  
158

159 **WAC 222. Washington State Forest Practices Rules-** The Forest Practices Board  
160 adopts The Forest Practice rules, adopted by the Forest Practices Board, give direction  
161 on how to implement the Forest Practices Act (Chapter 76.09 Revised Code of

162 Washington [RCW] and Stewardship of Non-industrial Forests and Woodlands (chapter  
163 76.13 RCW). The rules establish minimum standards for forest practices such as timber  
164 harvest, pre-commercial thinning, road construction, fertilization, and forest chemical  
165 application.

166 A Forest Practices Application (FPA) permit administered by the DNR may be required  
167 for activities that involve cutting trees or other activities that could involve impacts on the  
168 resources of the state, such as road-building. For detailed information pertaining to a

171 **WAC 232-12-011. Wildlife Classified as Protected Shall Not be Hunted or Fished -**  
172 Sensitive species are any wildlife species native to the state that are vulnerable or  
173 declining and are likely to become endangered or threatened in a significant portion of  
174 their range within the state without cooperative management or removal of threats.

175 **WAC 232-12-292. Bald Eagle Protection Rules -** The purpose of these rules is to  
176 protect the habitat and thereby maintain the population of the bald eagle so that the  
177 species is not classified as threatened, endangered, or sensitive in Washington State.  
178 This can best be accomplished by promoting cooperative efforts to manage for eagle  
179 habitat needs through a process which is sensitive to the landowner goals as well. The  
180 following rules are designed to promote such cooperative management.

181 **RCW 77.12.650. Protection of Bald Eagles and Their Habitats — Cooperation**  
182 **Required -** The department shall cooperate with other local, state, and Federal agencies  
183 and governments to protect bald eagles and their essential habitats through existing  
184 governmental programs, including the following:

- 185 1. The natural heritage program managed by the Department of Natural Resources  
186 under chapter 79.70 RCW
- 187 2. The natural area preserve program managed by the Department of Natural  
188 Resources under chapter 79.70 RCW
- 189 3. The shoreline management master programs adopted by local governments and  
190 approved by the Department of Ecology under chapter 90.58 RCW (WASL  
191 2007).

192 **RCW 77.12.655. Habitat Buffer Zones for Bald Eagles - Rules -** The department, in  
193 accordance with chapter 34.05 RCW, shall adopt and enforce necessary rules defining  
194 the extent and boundaries of habitat buffer zones for bald eagles. Rules shall take into  
195 account the need for variation of the extent of the zone from case to case, and the need  
196 for protection of bald eagles. The rules shall also establish guidelines and priorities for  
197 purchase or trade and establishment of conservation easements and/or leases to protect  
198 such designated properties. The department shall also adopt rules to provide adequate  
199 notice to property owners of their options under RCW 77.12.650 and this section.

200 **RCW 90.48. State Water Pollution Control Act-** The Act was created to protect the  
201 quality of all waters of the state for public health and enjoyment. It is written broadly and  
202 mandates the protection of all uses and benefits of water including water supplies,  
203 wetlands, commerce and navigation, recreation, fish and wildlife habitat, and aesthetics.

204 **RCW 90.58. Shoreline Management Act-** The Shoreline Management Act regulates  
205 wetlands within 200 feet of shoreline water bodies and wetlands associated with these  
206 water bodies.

207 **RCW 17.10. Noxious Weeds - Control Boards** - This is the primary noxious weed law,  
208 and it holds landowners, including state and county land agencies, responsible for  
209 controlling noxious weeds on their property. It also establishes a program for  
210 administering the noxious weed law, which is carried out by the Washington State  
211 Noxious Weed Control Board, the Washington State Department of Agriculture, and  
212 individual County noxious weed boards. Information specific to invasive species on

214 **WAC 16.750. State Noxious Weed List and Schedule of Monetary Penalties** - This  
215 WAC contains the Noxious Weed List, which is updated every year, and definitions, and  
216 descriptions of regional boundaries for Class B designated weeds. More information can  
217 be found at <http://www.nwcb.wa.gov/index.htm>.

218  
219 **WAC 220. Fish and Wildlife, Fisheries** - This title outlines general fishing provisions,  
220 including personal and commercial-use permits and license requirements, species  
221 classifications, and fisheries management.

222  
223 **WAC 232. Fish and Wildlife, Wildlife** - This title outlines permit and license  
224 requirements, species classifications, game seasons, hours and bag limits, nuisance  
225 wild animals, and general hunting and trapping provisions. Protection of nongame birds  
226 and other wildlife from hunting or harm is also addressed. Also outlines rules for  
227 classifying threatened, endangered, or otherwise sensitive species, and the violations  
228 and penalties associated with injuring and removing them.

## 229 **County**

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231  
232 **Pierce County Critical Areas Ordinance. Section 18E.40.020 Fish and Wildlife**  
233 **Species and Habitat Conservation Areas** - This regulation pertains to individuals, and  
234 habitat for federally and state-listed species and species of concern in Pierce County,  
235 including populations of importance, vulnerable aggregations of species listed by the  
236 WDFW, and habitats of local importance.

237  
238 Oregon white oak woodlands, stands, and individual trees meeting the following criteria  
239 are considered to be priority habitat and are subject to protection under the provisions of  
240 this law:

241  
242 **Priority Oregon White Oak Woodlands** - stands of Oregon white oak or  
243 oak/conifer associations where the stand is at least one acre in size and the  
244 canopy coverage of the oak component of the stand is greater than or equal to 25  
245 percent.

246

247 **Significant Oaks and Stands.** Within the urban growth area, single oaks or stands of  
248 oaks smaller than one acre in size when any of the following criteria are met:

249

- 250 • Individual trees having a diameter at breast height of 20 inches or more; or
- 251 • Oregon white oak stands in which the oak trees have an average diameter at
- 252 breast height of 15 inches or more regardless of stand size.
