#### **EMD Remarks:**

#### John Ufford, for the Director

- John Ufford (EMD) extended a welcome to the EMC. Ongoing actions of hiring for the 911 Unit Manager and the Deputy Director continues to move forward, with final interviews scheduled. Cascadia Rising After Action Report is moving through the coordination process and is going through rewrites for clarification purposes. This document will be made available after the edits following coordination efforts. January 5<sup>th</sup> is the date for presentation to the Governor for a recap of the findings. Lit Dudley will spearhead the updated 14-day preparedness messaging, along with support from Karina Shagren. EMC support, Kristin Ramos, will be moving to a new position in Commerce in the middle of November. Appreciation expressed for the support provided.
- Robert Ezelle (EMD) will be meeting with the Governor on January 5<sup>th</sup> with recommendations from Cascadia Rising. Outreach efforts continue with Limited English Proficient (LEP) community, access and functional needs community, and other developing partnerships across the state. A quarterly Winter Storm exercise took place last week. Group work replaced the traditional horseshoe discussion.
  - EMD shared Washington disaster response visit with the Chinese delegation. In China, disaster response is military-driven.
  - Robert Ezelle (EMD) will check with the Governor's Policy Office to determine where the EMC is regarding the request for Governor's Office representation (Jim Baumgart, GOV). Mr. Baumgart will be be added to the EMC distribution list for future meetings.

#### **FEMA Remarks:**

### Bryant Harrison for Ken Murphy, Administrator

1. FEMA is currently supporting Hurricane Matthew recovery efforts and reconstituting FEMA staff. Regional staff have returned to the region. There are continued efforts on corrective actions as a result of Cascadia Rising, as well as developing mass power outage scenarios. FEMA is currently working under continuing resolution with no adopted budget. The next President will determine the next FEMA Region X administrator.

- Monthly meetings are held to discuss agenda items and changes that need to be made as the EMC assumes the SAC role. Additional members need to be identified to meet the requirements of the SAC and whether any legislative changes need to be made.
- For the December meeting the Executive Committee will review direction of the SAC and next steps with a goal of finalization at the beginning of the calendar year.
- 2. EMC Report to the Governor
  - The Council was instructed to review the previous years' report for review (available at <u>http://mil.wa.gov/uploads/pdf/emergency-management/signed-annual-report-package.pdf</u>) and to identify the level of detail to be included in the report.
  - Ron Averill (Chair) reviewed an outline of what should be included in the 2016 Report, with a
    paragraph on significant findings from the Cascadia Rising exercise, including recommendations. Mass
    fatality planning statewide needs to be included as a subject area.
  - Subcommittee and workgroup reports will be added as addendums to the report. The Whole Community Subcommittee report needs to be submitted, as well as updates on the WAMAS and SERC subcommittee.
  - Ron Averill (Chair) requested input for the report by the end of November. All committee chairs have been contacted and Dan Banks will follow up with contacts not present at the meeting.
  - Last year's report had several unaddressed recommendations, to be included in the current report as still open and needing attention.
  - Bill Gillespie (SAR) wants to include gaps in the report to the Governor so that he is aware of areas where sustainable funding is justified.
- 3. Governor's Office Representative to the EMC
  - Dick Walter (Vice Chair) reiterated the need to have feedback from the previous report before providing additional information on the current report. A formalized response from the Governor's Office was requested.

    - Task completed
  - Human Capital-Need for EMATs
    - Still in progress determining how to staff Emergency Management Assistance Teams (EMATs)
  - o Two Weeks Preparedness Messaging Roll-Out
    - Additional research is needed to provide an accurate preparedness message.
    - Bill Gillespie (SAR) has concerns about the public having buy-in for 14-day preparedness efforts as a result of the recent weather event, which was not as severe as anticipated. Meaningful messages need to be provided for the public benefit.

- Sue Bush (DSHS) provided a perspective on the impoverished community, and the challenges of . living day to day. Service gaps need to be identified for servicing these communities
- Dick Walter (Vice Chair) reiterated using the EMD website for best practices. Successes and best practices should be shared at EMC meetings. Start looking at supplementing EMC meetings with measurements of success. Metrics are lacking regarding how many businesses have been contacted with which types of plans are in place and if planning is moving in the right direction.
- Alysha Kaplan (EMD) summarized different educational programs that are already in place around the state.

#### State Emergency Response Commission 3.

• Quarterly SERC meeting held November 2<sup>nd</sup>, and bylaws are being reviewed to ensure accurate representation.

#### **Seismic Safety** 4.

- Next meeting will be December 9<sup>TH</sup>. Discussion will include Cascadia Rising and were we stand on Resilient Washington and what actions have been taken to date.
- Involved in earthquake early warning for Washington, with ongoing weekly discussion. The system is 0 much broader than Western Washington
- The M9 project is a grant from the University of Washington. Mission Ready Packages are being developed from state surveys to establish agreements to have geologists and other requested staff move from one state to another to provide assistance.
- Fire Management 0
  - DNR fire activity is transitioning into post fire activity after an "average year", with tracking of financial activities underway. Preparations are in progress for the next fire season. Decision packages to the legislature have been prepared to help lawmakers understand the degree of assistance required to fight wildfires.
  - When there are multiple states competing for fire resources, agreements in place across states and with the federal government are utilized. Resources are shared as requested and available, with coordination both interstate and international.
  - Federal assistance triggers include exceeding a suppression cost threshold. When a fire hits a threat level, a request for an FMAG declaration can be made, which brings a substantial amount of fire suppression assistance, based on 75% of eligible costs.

### 5. Senior Advisory Committee (SAC)

#### Intrastate Mutual Aid (Washington Mutual Aid System-WAMAS) 6.

The subcommittee has completed efforts for the remainder of the year, with no additional meetings having taken place. Training is continuing to be offered to local jurisdictions, with local recommendations incorporated into the training.

## 7. Infrastructure Resilience Subcommittee (IRSC)

- 2017 IRSC meeting dates are January 18th, April 19th, July 19th and October 18th. •
- The Subcommittee is currently focused on recruiting participation from infrastructure owners, both public and private.
- The draft charter for IRSC will be reviewed at the January 18th meeting. •
- The IRSC top areas of focus for 2017:
  - Validate the WA State Core Capability Strategic Planning Framework Infrastructure Systems section Desired Outcomes;
  - Update the WA Infrastructure Protection Plan (WIPP) targeted for release in May 2017; and
  - o Identify issues, areas of concern, and potential programs to be brought to the EMC.

• Last meeting was August 2<sup>nd</sup>, and next meeting is November 8<sup>th</sup>, with call-in and webinar capability.

- 2016 SPR will be the 10<sup>th</sup> integration for Washington State, the 6<sup>th</sup> iteration using the Core Capabilities and the 5<sup>th</sup> iteration using the THIRA as a guide for the assessment.
- Fire Management and Suppression was added as a result of the National Preparedness Goal refresh, and designated a high priority.
- Washington State decided that Cybersecurity (federal) crosses all mission areas in Washington, so this capability is listed as "Common" for Washington
- Prioritization has not changed from when established in the Training and Exercise plan in 2013.
- The Core Capability leadership program is refreshed each January, with leads and co-leads identified and/or updated.
- In June, Regional assessment data was compiled from workshops with regional coordinators, focusing the four Common capabilities and the twelve Response capabilities.
- Regional data was compiled during the Cascadia Rising timeframe and data was presented to stakeholders.
- Core Capability leads engaged in workshops to complete the state assessment for this year for ratings, gap descriptions, and recent advances.
- Next Steps:
  - November 18<sup>th</sup> will be the presentation to TAG.
  - November 23<sup>rd</sup> is the target date to the Governor.
  - December 9<sup>th</sup> is the deadline for input to the FEMA Unified Reporting Tool.
  - December 16<sup>th</sup> is the deadline for submission to FEMA.
- Barb Graff (City of Seattle) asked about the rating methodology. Jennifer Schaal (EMD) explained the averaging methodology, with regional ratings carrying a heavier weight (nine regional ratings averaged

against one state rating, except for the Common capabilities which may have multiple state agency ratings).
